Holy Mass Updates

We are truly blessed that our Church is open and we are grateful for all of our Parish Family who are looking our for each other and abiding by the directives that are in place. Please remember:



- You must sign up to attend a weekday or weekend Holy Mass. Please call, text or email Connie at 306-634-2190, 306-421-8447 or conniesjb@gmail.com.
- You must do the self-assessment before you arrive at the Church and have no symptoms of cough, cold, flu, or allergies. The self-assessment will be emailed to you the day before you are scheduled to attend a Holy Mass.
- The Province of Saskatchewan states that if you travel out of the province, you must self-monitor for symptoms of Covid-19 for 14 days. During the 14 days, we ask that you seriously consider where you have travelled to and who you have been in contact with and whether it is safe for you to come to Church. If you decide that you are confident in coming to Church, you will be required to wear a mask during your 14 day self-monitoring.
- If you have travelled to or through the West Central or Southwest parts of Saskatchewan in the past 14 days, we ask that you wear a mask if you come to Church.
- Social distancing will be adhered to.

Homily Corner



This is a recap of my homily from the previous weekend. This past Sunday's homily was on the readings for the 18th Sunday of Ordinary Time. The first reading was Isaiah 55:1-3, the second reading was Romans 8:35, 37-39 and the Gospel reading was Matthew 14:13-21.

This Sunday the readings take on the theme of the Miracles of Jesus. As we contemplate the readings for the next few weeks, we will come to know that we are the miracles of God.

Sometimes we pray for many months and don't get an answer from God. Why? How can we be confident in God? Keep God first and trust him. This is a very important edict and we should all memorize it, keeping it in the forefront of our lives.

We seek miracles in our lives, but we quite often look to magic instead. A miracle is totally different from magic. As with all the miracles we see in the Bible, today's Gospel shows us that miracles are moved forward by human intervention. After a long preaching, the disciples asked Jesus to send the crowd away so that they could get food. Jesus told the disciples to give the people something to eat. They had only five loaves of bread and two fish, but they did as Jesus told them and what was left over after everyone ate was much more than what they began with.

God's miracles are everlasting. He made us in his image and likeness, forming and moulding us from the clay of the earth, then he breathed on us and we began to grow and the human race expanded. He worked very hard to create us and at the end of the day, God saw that everything was awesome, amazing, miraculous.

Our unanswered prayers are prayers where we compel God to do magic in our lives. We ask why there are no miracles in our family, in our lives. This is because we are asking for magic and the response we want is not possible. We don't want to change or grow, but we want God to magically make our lives better. We have to keep God first and trust him. Only if we move forward with activism, will we see miracles in our lives. Just like the stories in the Bible, miracles take human intervention.

This week, as you spend time in quiet reflection, think about how much you trust God. Is there something in your life that you need to let go of and trust in God? Is God first in your life?

Monday, August 10 Feast of St. Lawrence

St. Lawrence suffered his martyrdom in the year 258, three days after Sixtus II and six other deacons. A defender of the Church in Rome, he was one of the most venerated Roman martyrs of the early Church and is a patron of Rome.

Tuesday, August 11 Memorial of St. Clare

St. Clare was born in Assisi. At the age of 18 she heard a sermon by Francis of Assisi and committed herself to a life of poverty. She formed a religious community that modelled their life on the ideals of St. Francis and she authored the first rule for religious life for women written by a woman.

Friday, August 14 Memorial of St. Maximilian Kolbe

St. Maximilian was a Franciscan who spread the Gospel in his native Poland as well as Japan. During the Nazi occupation of Poland, he was arrested by the Gestapo and imprisoned. When a prisoner escaped, 10 men were chosen at random to die. Maximilian took a young father's place.

Saturday, August 15 Assumption of the **Blessed Virgin Mary**

The Assumption of the Virgin Mary celebrates her being assumed – taken up body and soul—into heaven at the end of her earthly life. The Western Church began to celebrate this feast around 650.
